

## GENERAL drain hoses & bring indoors turn off outdoor faucets at indoor shutoff & open faucet to let any water drain out bring non-weatherproof pots indoors VEGETABLES & HERBS overwinter carrots, turnips & parsnips: cover with straw/leaf mulch; harvest as necessary protect cool-season crops with a cold frame, plastic sheeting or floating row cover to extend productivity incorporate organic matter (like composted manure) into garden beds ensure indoor herbs are in full, direct sunlight or get 14 hours of flourescent light each day SHRUBS TREES keep planting trees & shrubs as long as ground isn't frozen water newly-planted trees & shrubs during dry sweep heavy snow off branches & prevent build-up on gutters & eaves above clear away weeds & dead leaves around the bases of shrubs & trees (especially fruit trees) to reduce chance of rodent damage WILDLIFE provide food (including suet) & water for birds clean seed hulls under feeders so they won't supress plant growth

put hummingbird feeders awaykeep spraying deer repellants

ANNUALS OF PEKENN
keep watering perennialsin dry weather until 2 <sup>nd</sup> heavy frost
mulch perennials after first hard freeze with 1-2" of compost, shredded hardwood or pine mulch
cover bare soil with mulch to prevent erosion
<ul> <li>apply compost to beds if you haven't already</li> </ul>
ollect seeds
remove fallen leaves from on top of & around evergreen perennials
protect potted perennials (if you haven't put them in the ground) by covering with 8-10" of leaves (uncover in March)
mulch lavender with gravel (marble is best)
LAWN
rake leaves off lawn or chop them with a mulching mower & allow to decompose on the lawn
service mower after final mowing of the year
HOUSEPLANTS
check plants for pests (scale, mealybugs, spider mites) & treat as needed
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wake up potted amaryllis: water once, place in a bright location & wait for them to respond; water again in 2 weeks if they

haven't responded
