

GENERAL
drain hoses & bring indoors
turn off outdoor faucets at indoor shutoff & open faucet to let any water drain out
pile leaves in a corner of the yard to decay& use as compost next year
create new beds: cut grass low, cover with newspaper, then layers of organic matter, followed by a thick layer of straw or mulch
vegetables & herbs
overwinter carrots, turnips & parsnips: cover with straw/leaf mulch; harvest as necessary
 protect cool-season crops with a cold frame, plastic sheeting or floating row cover to extend productivity
sow spinach for early spring harvest
 incorporate organic matter (like composted manure) into garden beds
CUD UBC & TOCCO
SHRUBS & TREES
keep planting trees & shrubs
keep shrubs & trees well watered through first frost to ensure they go into winter hydrated
use burlap to protect plants that are susceptible to breakage from snow

if you haven't already, apply a slow release

fertilizer (like Espoma)

ANNUALS & PERENNIALS plant pansies & ornamental cabbage & kale for cool temperature color keep watering perennials until 2nd heavy frost cut back annuals & perennials after top foliage has died (leave seed heads of plants you want to self-sow & those of black-eyed Susans, coneflowers & native grasses for birds to feed on) & compost (just don't compost diseased foliage) mulch perennials after first hard freeze with 1-2" of compost, shredded hardwood or pine mulch ☐ cover bare soil with mulch or groundcovers to prevent erosion add organic matter to garden beds by mixing a 6-8" layer of leaf compost or well-rotted manure, then cover with mulched leaves LAWN apply fertilizer if you haven't already (note: it is illegal to apply fertilizer between Nov. 15 & March 1) apply lime to adjust lawn pH rake leaves off lawn or chop them with a mulching mower & allow to decompose on the lawn service mower after final mowing of the year





WILDLIFE

- provide food (including suet) & water for birds
- clean bird baths, feeders & nest boxes
- pile leaves & trimmings in a corner of the yard for winter protection for ground-dwelling birds & hibernating reptiles

BULBS

- continue planting spring-blooming bulbs
- dig & store tender bulbs before ground freezes: after frost blackens foliage, cut back to 6" & dig up, wash off soil, let dry for 2 weeks, then store in boxes filled with peat moss/bark chips in a cool, dry place
- pot paperwhite bulbs starting now (plant every 2-3 weeks for continuous flowers)

HOUSEPLANTS

reduce feeding schedule to once a month

PESTS

- keep spraying deer repellants if deer are a problem
- spray hemlocks infected with wooly adelgids (look like spray-on snow) with horticultural oil when temperatures will be above freezing for 24 hours after application
- remove bagworm bags from plants & dispose of them in the trash
- prune away branches with egg masses of the Eastern tent caterpillar (look like shiny, black styrofoam)
